Editorial.

" Things growing are not ripe until their season."

The end of the School year is both pleasant and unpleasant. Pleasant, because the holidays are approaching ; and unpleasant, since the Exams.—the bane of a schoolboy's existence—have first to be negotiated. Still more unpleasant is the fact that the Upper Sixth, and the majority of the Upper Fifth will leave the School for ever. Some will go to the University, some will enter a profession, and some again will take up a business career ; but wherever Fate may cast them, our best wishes for a successful future go with them.

At the end of last quarter, Mr. Mottershead left the School to become second master at the Cathedral School. We congratulate him on his appointment, and his loss will be regretted by all the School, especially by those in tennis and cricket circles, in which sports he took a keen interest. Mr. J. Neilson, of the Queensland University, has joined the staff. Mr. Clark has also left us to become Modern Language Master at Scots College, Melbourne. He will be greatly missed by those whom he taught, and our good wishes accompany him.

The Annual Athletic Sports were held at the Exhibition Grounds on Wednesday, September 15th, and four records were broken. We offer our congratulations to K. B. Fraser, who has won the "Courier" Trophy a second time. In the inter-School Sports, held at the Exhibition Grounds, we succeeded in defeating both Ipswich and Toowoomba.

In spite of scarcity of fixtures, the football season ended well, and Toowoomba was defeated in the Chelmsford Cup competition by 9-3. The Honour Caps for this year were awarded to Freeman, Hammond, and Fraser, who fully merited them. In the Lower School competition, the Lower Modern XV. won the shield presented by Mr. Bousfield. This now hangs in the Hall, and will be competed for each year.

The tennis season closed with a defeat from Nudgee College, but the match with Ipswich is still to be played, which will perhaps give the team a chance to retrieve its fortunes.

Consequent upon the admission of so many new rowing members, the School is now about to form a Rowing Club of its own. We hope that the venture will be successful, and that it will promote the rowing interest in the School. A trial race is being arranged with Southport for this month, so that the crew is training hard.

On account of the suspension of compulsory training, drill is carried on under the voluntary system, but there has not been as large an attendance as was expected at the voluntary parades. At such a time as this, each cadet should become as efficient as possible, and we hope that there will be a larger attendance in the future.

With great pride we have seen our "Roll of Honour" of Old Boys who are fighting for the Empire, gradually increase throughout the year, until it now reaches a total of 390. Of this number 17 are known to have been killed in action. It is a matter of great satisfaction to know that all those of whose death we have received any particulars, have fallen gloriously, doing their duty bravely to the end.

When the Magazine published its first "Roll of Honour," a year ago, the number of our Old Boys in the field was a little less than one hundred; now the number of those who have offered their services has risen to 390. Whether our Empire, in conflict with nations where a training to bear arms is part of the routine of every citizen's life, can win through, relying only upon the

volunteers, "that have honour and courage and resolution in them," may be a question.* But all honour to those who have helped her to do it so far; who early saw the way to go—and went.

And let us not forget the no less courageous band of those, who have accepted uncomplainingly, and almost cheerfully, the burden of daily-received anxiety and suspense—often receiving at the end, for all reward, the tidings they have dreaded from the first.

The following members of the Expeditionary Forces served also in the South African War:—Colonel V. Sellheim, Lieut.-Colonel R. M. Stodart, Lieut.-Colonel Hubert Harris, V.D., Major L. C. Wilson, Major H. Carter, Major T. J. Logan, Captain J. E. Dods, Captain Donald Cameron, Captain J. M'Leod, Lieutenant F. Newton, Private R. H. Whipham. Captain D. C. Cameron joined the 6th Contingent for the Boer War as a Private. He was mentioned in despatches three times, and promoted to a Lieutenancy, and subsequently to a Captaincy in the Imperial Army, and studied at the Hythe School of Musketry. In the present war Captain Cameron has been wounded twice, and is now in hospital in England.

We have heard with great regret that Captain (Dr.) Espie Dods is among the wounded. From a Queensland Officer's letter in the "Telegraph" we make the following extract:—"Within half-an-hour of our arrival we were under shrapnel fire. The bullets lashed all round and about us, but we got through all right. Half-a-dozen shells followed, and dust jets rose all about us. One man got a bullet in the groin, another further across the gully was also struck. Captain Dods walked out to attend to this last man, but had not proceeded far when he, too, was struck. He was idolised by the men here, and his sterling worth was attested by the concern that soon spread among officers and men, when the fact became known that Doctor Dods was wounded."

Sergeant L. Brydon has been wounded, but we are pleased to hear that he is progressing satisfactorily.

Captain F. Moran, our late Area Officer, must be added to the list of those who have given their lives for the cause of liberty in the present great struggle. An enthusiast in his work, nothing was too much trouble for him where the welfare of the Senior Cadets was concerned, and they all loved and respected him. He led the Brisbane Grammar School Cadets to victory in the last big competition amongst cadets—a victory largely gained by reason of his ability to infuse into others the enthusiasm which he always displayed himself in all military matters. He can ill be spared, for he was in all respects a hero and a gentleman. (Adapted from the "Brisbane Courier.")

We have received from Mrs. Moran, two soldiers' letters, from which we make the following extracts:—"I happened to be with your son, Captain Moran, right through the charge on the 7th and 8th August. He received his wound on Sunday, August 8th.

As soon as he got wounded, I brought him back under cover, and dressed his wound where the bullet made in the back and right shoulder, and I then took him down and got him on the Hospital ship. Later on, I got on the same boat, and I stayed at his bedside until he died on August 20th, and was buried at sea. When I saw that his last moments were drawing near, I got the Priest to see him. He was buried just before we got into Gibraltar, and was also buried by a few of the boys of his own Battalion. I may say we have lost a captain who can never be replaced for the gallant work which he has done during this campaign, and who will live in the memory of the boys of the 15th Battalion. We always had such confidence in him. Your son was always at the front to lead his men, and every man would have laid down his life for him."

From a second letter: "Our best loved and respected officer, Captain Moran, has been killed. He died from his wounds, and I helped to bury him outside Gibraltar, he being on the boat that I came over in. He was the finest soldier in the regiment, and it is like losing a personal friend in losing 'our little skipper,' as he was affectionately called."

We have just heard, with much pleasure, that Sergeant R. G. Young is convalescent.

Still another officer who hails from the old B.G.S. is making a great reputation for himself. Thus a soldier writes of Colonel Stodart:—"I can tell you the Queensland people ought to be very proud of the 2nd Light Horse, as we have done some very fine work in the trenches. I am glad to say Colonel Stodart is still going strong. He is a great fighting man, and the men would do anything for him. The Colonel is like a father to everyone, looking after everyone's comforts. He seems to be taking a special interest in each man individually, and after about five minutes' talk with him, a fellow goes away feeling like a new man, and that there is no hardship in active service at all."

MR. LEA AND MR. FISCHER.

Mr. G. W. Lea, B.A., and Mr. E. M. Fischer, B.A., have resigned their positions on the Staff, in order to enlist in the Expeditionary Force. The Masters said good-bye to them at the end of October, and Mr. Bousfield, on behalf of the Staff, presented each of them with a wristlet watch. May good luck attend both of them, and may we see them again at work in the B.G.S. after they have returned in triumph from the Front!

Among the missing lately reported, we notice with extreme regret the names of Major H. D. Cannan and Sergeant A. L. Kenyon.

Trooper A. M. Morrison, 5th L.H., has returned from Gallipoli badly wounded. He is bearing his trouble bravely, and with good hopes of steady improvement.

In this issue, Private T. Newsham, of the 1st British Grenadiers, who fought at Neuve Chapelle, tells how he lost his leg. It is satisfactory to know that he is making a good recovery, and all the friends of his school days will, we are sure, join us in wishing him good luck.

Corporal W. Webb, of the A.M.C., who was wounded while succouring the wounded, has returned home. We are pleased to hear that he is progressing favourably.

From a recent issue of the "Newingtonian," we have learnt that a Memorial Tablet has been erected at Newington College to the memory of Company-Sergeant Major Donald Neil Macgregor, lately a Master in Newington College, and an Old Boy of the Brisbane Grammar School, who was killed at the Dardanelles. In unveiling the tablet, the Headmaster of Newington referred in terms of high appreciation to the character and work of Mr. Macgregor. The inscription on the tablet is as follows:—

IN MEMORY OF
COMPANY SERGEANT-MAJOR DONALD NEIL MACGREGOR,
MASTER OF NEWINGTON COLLEGE,
BORN JANUARY 6TH, 1887.

KILLED IN ACTION AT THE DARDANELLES,
MAY 21ST, 1915.

How Some of Our Old Boys Died

"Sic Itur ad Astra."

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL HUBERT HARRIS (O.C. 5th Light Horse).

From a letter to Colonel Thynne, which appeared in the Press, we extract the following:—"In Divisional Orders this paragraph appears. The operations of the Fifth Light Horse involved the whole of the regiment, and their successful conduct reflect credit upon Lieut.-Colonel H. Harris, who directed the action."

Major R. C. Wilson, writing to Mrs. Harris, says:—"The 5th Light Horse manned our section of the trenches, and the Colonel took up his position at an observation post to watch the proceedings. The post consisted of a recess with sandbags on both ends and front, with a loophole in front. The attack of our Infantry provoked a return shell fire from the Turks. One of these shells

burst in front of the post, and a bullet therefrom struck the Colonel, killing him instantly. The regret both in the Regiment and the Brigade at our leader's loss is sincere. Colonel Harris proved by his energy and initiative that there was not a better soldier sent from Australia with the Light Horse." The following is an extract from Brigade Orders:—"The Brigadier-General Commanding 2nd Light Horse Brigade wishes to express his great regret at the death of Lieut.-Colonel H. Harris, who was killed in action on July 31st, and to convey his sympathy to the 5th Regiment who have suffered such an irreparable loss. By the death of Lieut.-Colonel Harris, the brigade loses one of its best soldiers." Orders of a similar nature were issued by General Birdwood, and by Brigadier-General Walker.

Trooper "Bluegum," in the "S.M. Herald," writes from Anzac:—"The Queenslanders loved him (Lieut.-Colonel Harris), and would follow him anywhere. He was a comparatively young man, and not yet 45 years of age. He started his soldiering in the Brisbane Grammar School Cadets and then joined the Queensland Rifles. Later, he served in the South African war, and came back a Captain. He wore the Victoria Decoration and the Queen's South African ribbon with 5 clasps. When the present war broke out he offered his services, and took command of the 5th L.H. . . . So here in the Hills of Gallipoli there passes to the Great Beyond another good Australian, a brave and gallant officer, a kindly and courteous gentleman. The Americans used to sing 'John Brown's body lies a-moulding in his grave: his soul goes marching on.' So the 5th Light Horse may well feel that the Spirit of Hubert Harris will go with them to victory."

MAJOR T. J. LOGAN, whose death we announced in our last issue, joined the Australian Forces as a Private for service in the Boer War, and was wounded in the neck at Sanna's Post. Although the wound was severe, he refused to leave his company. On his return to Queensland, he qualified himself for promotion, and had risen to the rank of Major at the time of his death.

From a soldier's letter, which appeared in the Press, we borrow the following:—"In our last charge, Major Logan was leading the regiment, and one of his brothers was with him. Major Logan was killed."

CAPTAIN W. A. LESLIE (7th Battery Field Artillery).

Lieut.-Colonel Rosenthal, in a letter of condolence to Mrs. Leslie, says:—"I should indeed be wanting in appreciation if I did not tell you how splendidly your son did his work. The service of his gun on May 5th, while shell was falling all round, was indicative of the highest courage on his part, and was much admired by us all."

Major F. A. Hughes, writing to Mrs. Leslie, on May 18th says :—" I am writing to let you know that your son met his death while fighting his gun, and bravely doing his duty as a gallant artillery man. Our battery was hotly engaged with the enemy's artillery about 9 a.m. on Thursday, 6th May—they having the advantage of a concealed position, while our guns were practically in the open in our Infantry firing line. Walter was in charge of No. 1 gun—the guns being fought separately with an officer in charge, when a shell entered the dug-out from which he was observing, and wounded him in the leg. He was removed from the battery to the beach, and thence to the hospital, being quite conscious, and even cheerful when he left. Unfortunately, the injury was more serious than it seemed, for he died about two hours afterwards from shock. . . . We can only hope that it may afford you some consolation to know that your son died while doing his duty to his King and country, and met his end in as brave a manner as any of us can hope to do, should it be our lot to fall."

Lieutenant W. J. Urquhart also writes, saying " that he was with Captain Leslie just after he was hit, but all he said to him was, ' I think we knocked that battery out—remember me to all the boys.' "

A nurse in one of the Military Hospitals at Alexandria, writes :—" I was talking to an artillery man who was present when Walter (Captain Leslie) was killed, and he told me the following, which I want to tell Mrs. Leslie. He said that Captain Leslie was very brave. He made all his men get into their dug-outs (they were under very heavy Turkish fire), and said that he was going to fire twenty shots from the gun himself. He went on and on, and the men begged him to let them relieve him, but he said, ' No, boys ; get back to your dug-outs,' and went on. The eighteenth shot was reached, when a Turkish shell burst near him, and he was put out—but he really died doing a brave deed."

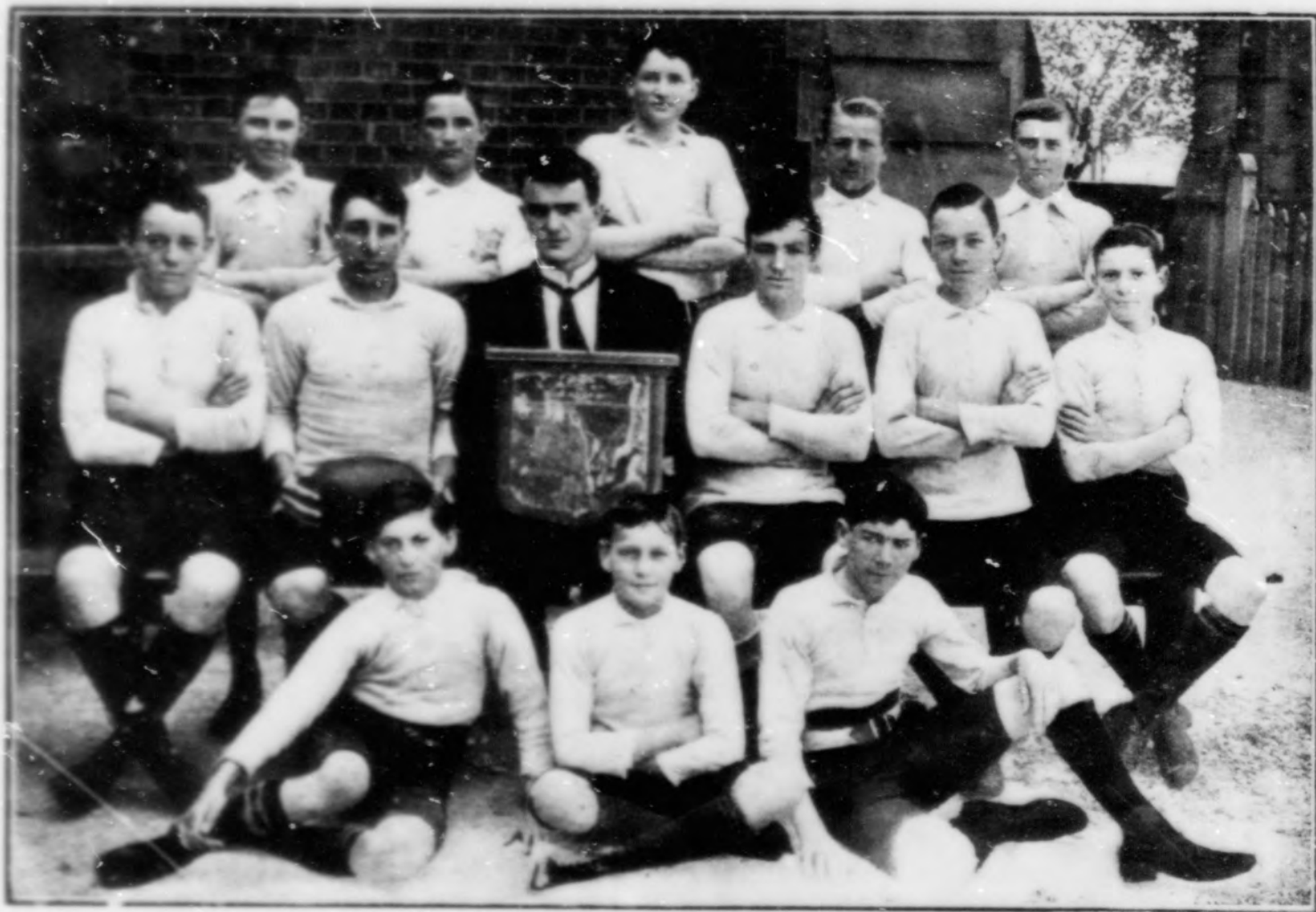
Cricket Notes.

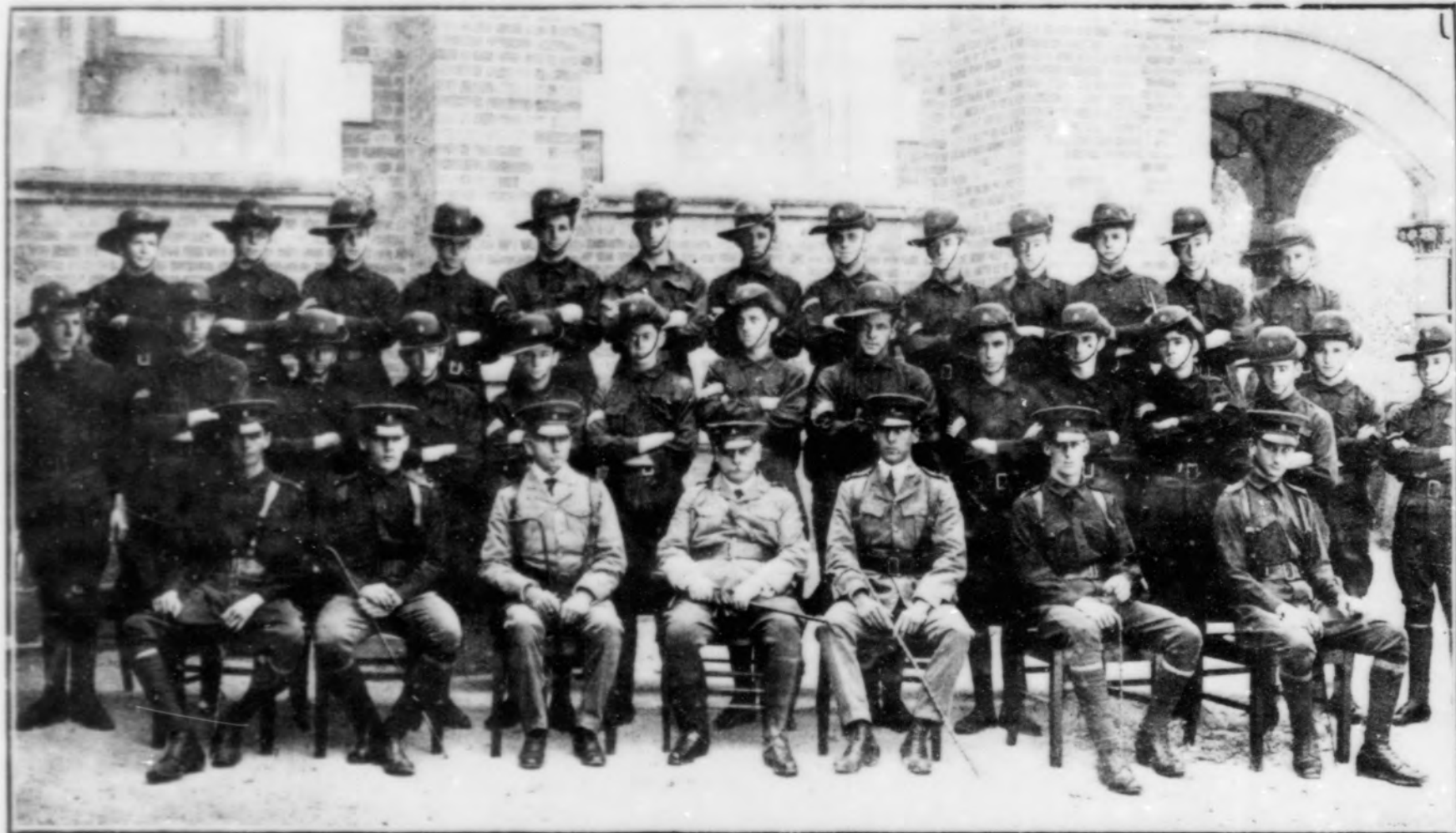
Cadet Notes

4 NEW SCHOOL RECORDS.

The Annual School Sports were held at the Exhibition on September 15th, and were an unqualified success. All the events were well contested, and some exceedingly close finishes resulted. F. W. Paterson won the 440 in 52 4/5 secs.; L. Tunley, the Mile in 4 min. 53 secs; K. B. Fraser the Hurdles in 18 4/5 secs, and the Broad Jump with 20ft 4 1/2 in. In all these events the existing records were broken. K. B. Fraser again won the "Courier" Cup for Champion Athlete, with 14 points. Shaw won the 130 Yards School Handicap off 13 yards, with Cory (5 yards) a good second. The 120 Yards Hurdles Handicap resulted in a dead-heat between Anderson and Shaw. This is a branch of athletics that could well be taken up more seriously in the School. At the Sports, the competitors in the Hurdles are usually conspicuous by their absence. In the handicap and under age events, Atthow, Shaw, Evans, Burguez, Stewart, Bennett, and Bartholomew showed up prominently. 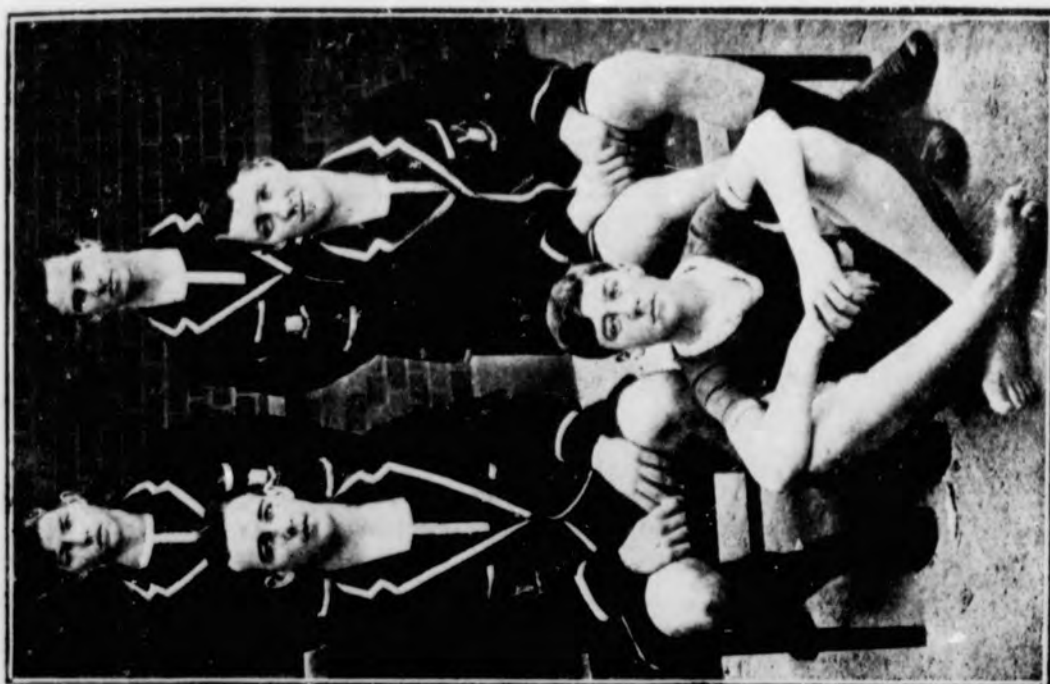

(W.W.W.)

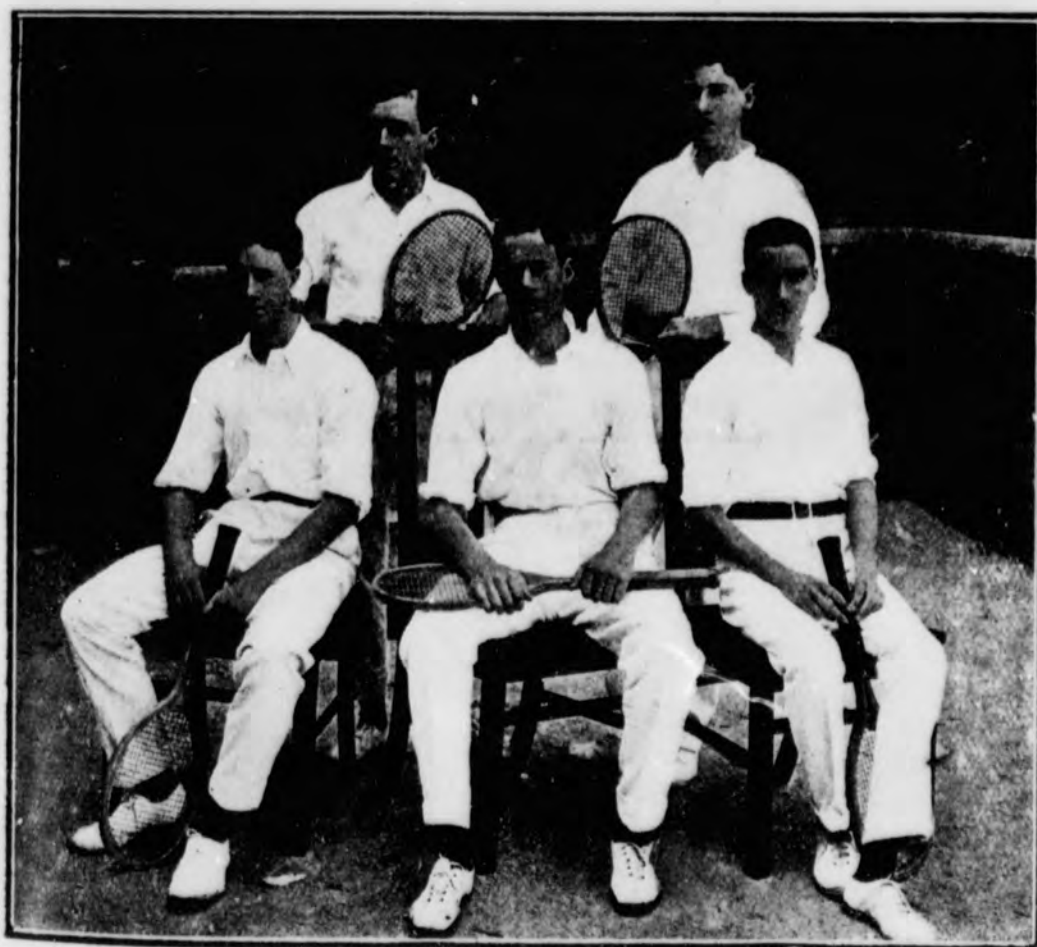

An Old Boy in Flanders

(Mr. T. Newsham, 1st Grenadier Guards).

Dear S.

I am very sorry I haven't written to you before. I received the letters you wrote to me from Honolulu and Sydney. One letter you wrote on October 31st, didn't reach me until six months after it was posted.

I have been in this hospital six weeks. I was nine weeks in hospital at Rouen. You know that I lost my left leg at Neuve Chapelle. I received a slight wound in the arm on March 13th, and helped a comrade named Ming (who was also wounded) to take a wounded man back to the dressing station. Brooks was his name. He was badly wounded, and we had a hard job getting him over the trenches, which were half-full of water. We left him at the dressing station in charge of a doctor. It was a mile in the rear of the fighting line.

The doctor told Ming and me to go to the cross roads, where we would find an ambulance to take us to the hospital at Merville. At the cross roads there were several ambulance waggons. A driver told us to jump in. Ming got in the waggon first, and I sat down beside him. I had just taken my seat when down came a shell. It burst inside the waggon and blew me out of it on to the road. A piece of the shell had hit my left knee. It was completely shattered. I was quite conscious, and I looked at it as I was lying on the road. The knee-cap seemed to have been torn off, and I could feel the shattered bones rattling against each other. Some men of the Royal Army Medical Corps put me on a stretcher and carried me into a shed. There was a doctor there, luckily for me. He gave me chloroform, and amputated the leg six inches above the knee. By so doing he saved my life. Ming was killed, poor chap. I was sent to the hospital at Rouen, where I received the best attention from the doctors and nurses. When I had recovered sufficiently, I was sent with 300 wounded men to England. I would have been better long ago if the stump hadn't been poisoned. I am getting better now, and am able to get out of bed. I nearly lost my right arm, a bullet grazed the elbow. Had it gone half-an-inch deeper, it would have smashed the joint. I would have lost the use of the arm, and would probably have had it amputated. There wouldn't have been much left of me then, one leg and one arm. There was a fellow in the same ward as I at Rouen who had not only lost his left leg, but his left arm was badly wounded. His hand and forearm had been smashed by shrapnel. The doctors were able to save it, but it is not likely that it will be much use to him; "C'est la guerre," as the French say. The Bristol people are very kind. They visit us on

Wednesdays and Sundays, and give us cigarettes and newspapers, and fruit, and eggs, and chocolate, and they take the wounded out for rides in motor cars.

P.S.—The Germans are the most civilised people on earth. They mix phosphorus in their shells and bullets to cause poisoning in the wounds they inflict, and they kill the British wounded who fall into their hands.

Old Boys' Association

Another member of our Council, Mr. G. S. Wilson, has gone into camp, and has, therefore, sent in his resignation as councillor. We shall miss him at the meetings, at which he was a regular attendant. But he has answered the call of duty, and we wish him every success, and a safe return.

We have received a very nice letter from the Rev. W. Little, of Ipswich, from which we quote the following:—"One of the requests he (Lieutenant E. M. Little) made when in the hospital was to pay the subscription to the B.G.S.O.B.A." It is pleasant to note that in the midst of his sad trial, he has not forgotten that he is an "Old Boy." Aye, and the Old Boys are not likely to forget him either.

A. E. Ogg has sent us a donation to the funds of the Association from Malborna, Evefield, which we have gratefully acknowledged.

Our warmest congratulations to Mr. Carlton R. Gregory, on his appointment to the high position of Clerk of the Legislative Council and Clerk of Parliaments. Mr. Gregory has already made a name for himself as an authority on Parliamentary statistics and procedure. *Ad multos annos!*

There is not one Old Boy or person in any way connected with the School, that does not sincerely join in the general regret at the death of Charles W. Costin, one of the very oldest and most enthusiastic members of our Association. Vice-President in 1904-5, President for two years, 1905-1907, and for years an active member of the Council, he has always displayed a keenness and zeal for

the welfare of the School and the Association that made him a most valued member. This, and his many high personal qualities, earned for him the sincere esteem and affection of all who came in contact with him. Of his value as a public man it is not our place to speak. The splendid eulogies which appeared in the papers are ample proof of the high esteem in which he was held by his fellow citizens. C. W. Costin's name will not easily be forgotten in Parliamentary circles, and many a man will feel that in losing him he has lost that best of possessions, a true friend.

From the list of Old Boys at the Front, compiled and given elsewhere, we note the large increase in numbers already so creditably high. We take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of the trouble and care which is being taken in collecting and arranging these particulars, which will form the basis of the records to be eventually entered in the Golden Book containing the Roll of Honour. Members will, we hope, do all they can to assist Mr. Mason in amassing details of names and achievements of our Old Boys who have gone to fight for us.

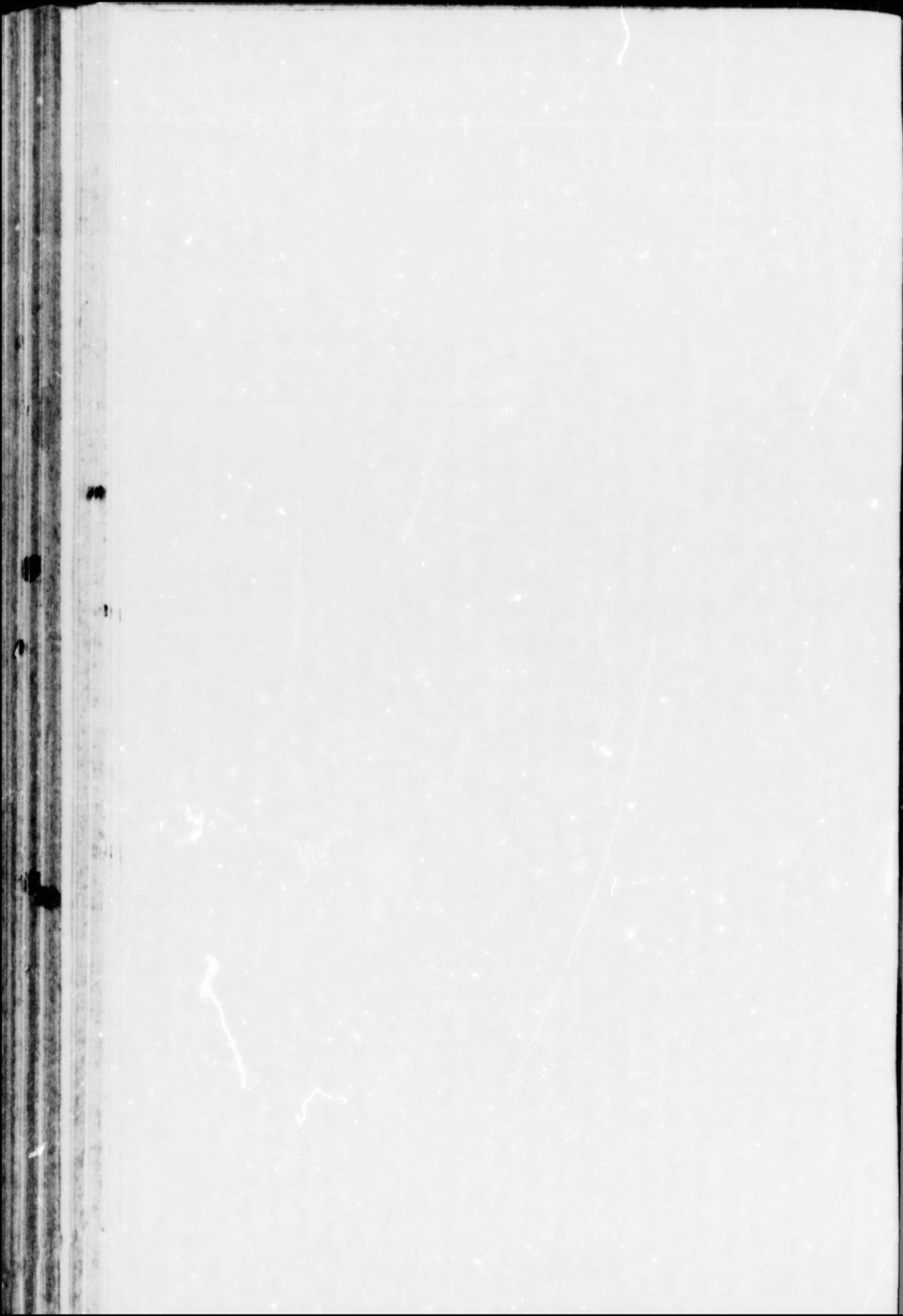
